

HALIFAX RESOLVES CHAPTER

VFW Post 3702 and the Halifax Resolves Chapter conducted a flag retirement ceremony on Oct. 15, 2011. VFW Post Commander David Cook welcomed the spectators, followed by the invocation given by Halifax Resolves Secretary-Treasurer Steve Avent. The SAR Color Guard posted the Colors, after which Cook led the gathering in the Pledge of Allegiance. Halifax Resolves Chapter President Ken Wilson read "I Am Your Flag," which was followed by the reading of "The Meaning of the Flag" by Cook. Ken Wilson and Avent, assuming the duties of burn master, performed the Preparation of the Flame, in which a piece each of redwood, oak, walnut and cedar are added to the fire in a symbolic purification of the flame. Each piece of wood has a specific meaning, which was read to the gathering as the piece was dropped into the fire. As Avent committed the

first flag to the flame, Wilson played "Taps." Avent then offered the benediction, closing the ceremony. A total of 192 U.S. flags were retired as well as several North Carolina, military service and first-responder flags. Ashes were buried in an unmarked grave in a local cemetery.







The 236th Anniversary of the Adoption of the Halifax Resolves will be held at 2 p.m. at the Colonial Courthouse. The Central Nash High


School JROTC Color Guard will present the colors assisted by the Combined NCSSAR Color Guard.

Halifax Resolves Celebration

Halifax, NC - On April 12, 1776 the Halifax Resolves were passed by the Fourth Provincial Congress of North Carolina that met in Halifax County. The Resolves were the very first instructions by any colony authorizing delegates to the Continental Congress to vote for independence from Great Britain. A total of 83 members voted unanimously

to authorize North Carolina's delegates to vote for independence. The Halifax Resolves did not authorize the three North Carolina delegates, William Hooper, Joseph Hewes and John Penn, to introduce a resolution to the Congress calling for independence. It only authorized them to vote for independence if such a resolution was made.

Resolves, North Carolina became the first colony to support independence from the crown, nearly three months before the Continental Congress announced the Declaration of Independence in July 1776.

It has been 236 years since the resolves were passed. This year the NCSSAR (North Carolina Sons of the American Revolution) celebrated the With the adoption of the Halifax Resolves and honored

presenting of the colors by the Nash Central High school ROTC. Glenn Sappie, the State President of the NCSSAR, welcomed everyone and expressed that "it was not an easy thing to sign and stand behind the commitment made by our forefathers for the freedoms of our United States."

The Halifax Resolves, as always traditionally done, were read this year by G. Steven Pittard. The key-note speaker was Gary Hackenburg, from Roanoke Rapids with his historical portrayal of Benjamin Franklin. Hakenburg, an accomplished actor, was dressed as Franklin, as many of the participants for the day's event were in period garb.

A salute to those who gave their lives for the freedoms we have today ended the official celebratory event. The Martha Washington Medal was presented to Stephanie Ann Brahin. The medal is awarded to ladies in recognition of outstanding service to the SAR.

Other certificates of appreciation were awarded to the groups that participated and made the day's event successful.

Joint Flag Retirement Held

The Halifax Resolves Chapter NCSSAR in conjunction with the Edwin Haynes Gregory American Legion Post 38 and the Warren Chapter NCSDAR held a joint Flag Retirement ceremony on the Colonial Courthouse site in Halifax.

Halifax Resolves Chapter President Mr. Ken Wilson welcomed approximately 50 participants and guests followed by the Invocation given by Chapter Chaplain Rev. Duncan

Jones. The Colors were presented by the Combined NC-SSAR Color Guard and Mrs. Constance Thacker, Regent of the Warren Chapter NCSDAR, led the gathering in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. President Wilson read "Remember Our Colors?" followed by Mrs. Thacker presenting "A Toast to the Flag". Mr. J. Rives Manning, Adjutant of American Legion Post 38, read the "Meaning of the Flag" followed by the "Preparation of



the Flag". Mr. J. Rives Manning, Adjutant of American Legion Post 38, read the "Meaning of the Flag" followed by the "Preparation of Asst. Scout Master of BSA" the Flame" presented by Halifax Resolves Chapter Sector Treas. Mr. Steve Avent and Burn Master Mr. James Tuck, Asst. Scout Master of BSA

On hand for the dedication was Mr. Carl Burke of Historic Halifax, NCSSAR President Mr. Glenn Sappie, the Combined NCSSAR Color Guard under the command of Maj. Richard D. Bishop, USA (Ret.) and Mr. Ken Wilson, President of the Halifax Resolves Chapter NCSSAR.

Halifax Resolves celebrates 236 years

On Saturday, April 7th, the Halifax Resolves Chapter of the North Carolina Society Sons of the American Revolution held a ceremony on the site of the Colonial Courthouse in Halifax celebrating the 236th Anniversary of the adoption of the Halifax Resolves. This document was adopted by the Provincial Congress on April 12th, 1776 and was sent the North Carolina representative to the Second Continental Congress in Philadelphia for their consideration. The document was adopted by this body after a hearty second by the Virginia Within two Colony. months the Declaration of Independence was written declaring our independence from Great Britain.

Saturday's ceremony was conducted honorwas opened by Halifax Resolves Chapter president Ken Wilson and the Invocation was three NCSSAR officers,

given by Chapter Chaplain Rev. Duncan Jones. The Nash Central High School JROTC presented the Colors assisted by the Combined NCS-SAR Color Guard. Ms. Gloria Goode sang the National Anthem followed by Chapter Color Guard Commander R. Allen Brahin leading the gathering in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Steve Avent, Halifax Resolves Sec.-Treas. led the SAR members in the SAR Pledge. NCSSAR President Glenn Sappie brought greetings from the North Carolina Society. President Wilson introduced the keynote speaker, Mr. Gary Hackenburg, who was portraying Thomas Jefferson. Following the keynote speech, a wreath laying ceremony was conducted honoring all our patriot ancestors who fought for our freedom. There were and nine SAR chapters presenting wreaths. Wreaths were also presented by five NCSDAR chapters and two NCSCAR societies. Four veterans' organizations and one Boy Scout Troop also participated.

In recognition of her outstanding service to and support of not only the Halifax Resolves Chapter, but also the North Carolina and Virginia Societies of the Sons of the American Revolution, Mrs. Stephanie Ann Brahin was awarded the prestigious SAR Martha Washington Medal.

Halifax Resolves revered at anniversary event







Revolutionary War veteran receives Patriot Grave Marker

On Saturday, the Halifax Resolves Chapter of the North Carolina Society of the Sons of the American Revolution dedicated a Patriot Grave Marker in honor of Private Frederick K. Shearin for his service during the American Revolution.

Shearin's grave is located outside of Littleton in the Shearin-Harris Cemetery off Shaw Springs Road in Warren County. There, members of the Halifax Resolves Chapter and others gathered to recognize Shearin and his sacrifice.

"We're in the process of marking the graves of those who fought in the American Revolution," said Glen Sappie, president of the North Carolina Society Sons of the American Revolution. "About 140,000 graves have been marked. There were 250,000 who fought in the war, maybe up to 300,000 who supported the cause of American freedom. We're about halfway done."

Wayne Haithcock, a descendent of Shearin, said that oftentimes the sacrifices of those who fought in the American Revolution are overlooked.

"Think of all the wars we've had over the years," said Haithcock. "When did we get our freedom and where from? The

Revolutionary War is a forgotten war. This is how we got our independence.

"We had people who stood up for the cause. When they started this war it was against great odds: They were up against a world power, but with persistence and good leadership, we won that war and our freedom."


Shearin was a native of Bute County, N.C. and was drafted in 1780. Under the leadership of Col. Benjamin Seawell and Gen. Ned Sumner, Shearin marched from North Carolina to South Carolina and then back to North Carolina before he became ill. He was discharged prior to recovery when his four-month term expired.

Shearin was drafted again in 1781 for a three-month tour and marched to Harrisburg. He fought in the Battle of Guilford Courthouse and was severely wounded. With his term nearly out, Shearin was sent home.

Shearin never fully recovered from his wound and later died in Warren County in

Among those on hand for Saturday's ceremony were North Carolina Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution historian Karen Powell, Halifax Resolves Chapter president Ken Wilson and chaplain Rev. Duncan Jones and Warren Chapter regent Constance Thacker.






Colonial soldier honored

Revolutionary War soldier Frederick K. Shearin was honored in Littleton Saturday, The Halifax Resolves Chapter, North Carolina Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, dedicated a Patriot marker at Shearin's grave, located in the **Shearin-Harris Cemetery** behind the Patchwork Pallet, 267 Shaw Springs Road in Littleton. Born in 1761, Shearin was a private in the Bute County militia. He served two enlistments in the Bute County militia - the second in 1781 when he fought in the Battle of **Guilford Courthouse and** was severely wounded. Frederick died in Warren County, in 1845.




