

Message from the President

Compatriots,

This month we are set, as a state society, to honor 14 free black patriots. The importance of this should not be overlooked or lessened. After our meeting upon the 12th, there will be the regularly scheduled events at the Guilford Courthouse on the 15th. On the 16th, the memorial service for these black patriots will be held.

Some of you may not realize or are unaware of the events around the War for Independence which relate to the Black community during that time period. We will never know the full number of enslaved or free men who fought or supported either side during the war. I, myself, knew on an intellectual level that African origin and mulatto individuals fought for our side. However, recently I have begun to research further into the roles played and politics of the time before, during, and after the War. It has been an eye opening experience in some respects. Most of us learned about the institution of slavery here in the Carolinas while in school or had/have children who did so during their schooling.

While the institution cannot be denied to have existed, the fact remains that there were a larger number of free or freed individuals than most people realize. It is an accepted fact that most free Blacks fought for the Colonies against the British while many slaves flocked to the other side. The culture at the time was varied and complex. Regardless, it is important that we recognize the contribution of these patriots who served our country as so many other patriots did. We may never know them all, just as we don't know everyone who served or supported our independence. Whether you can attend or not, please keep this in your hearts and minds.

Our Chapter has been busily represented in recent events statewide and also in VA. I would like to take this moment to thank RJ Myrick for his efforts on flag certificates, as well as representing the chapter at the Board of Managers meeting and presenting a wreath for the chapter at Cowens Ford. R. Allen has been busy presenting wreaths at Cowpens in January and the Crossing of the Dan in February. As usual, Ken Wilson remains

busy with his district duties but keeps an eye on me and the chapter. (He gets help with this from Steve Avent. It takes both to make sure I'm not missing something.). In short, thank you to all who participate and help make our chapter the greatest in the nation.


The March meeting will be held on **Wed.**, **March 12**, at the Halifax Baptist Church on **131 Prussia Street in Halifax at 6:30 pm**.
