Minutes of July, 2018, Meeting

The Halifax Resolves Chapter of the NCSSAR met on Wednesday, July 11, 2018, at the Halifax United Methodist Church in Halifax, NC. President David Gammon called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm. Rev. Duncan Jones gave an invocation, and then Compatriot Rives Manning led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the US Flag. President Gammon led the members in the SAR Pledge. The following guests were introduced: Seth Warner, Social Studies Teacher at Roanoke Rapids High School, Daisy Dolicker, President of the NC CAR, and her father George Dolicker.

In the absence of Secretary/Treasurer Steve Avent, President Gammon briefly discussed the minutes from the previous meeting, which were approved. The Treasurer's report indicated a total balance of \$2100.15, of which the subcategories include the Youth Fund with a balance of \$540.00 and the General Fund with a balance of \$1560.15. The Treasurer's report was approved.

Under old business, the following topics were discussed:

- Compatriot Wilson described the recent grave marking of Compatriot James Carlos Harris, held June 16 at Buxton Hall near Inez.

- Compatriot Wilson listed a few upcoming events that will involve our chapter.

Under new business, the following topics were discussed:

Mr. Warner has had numerous students participate in the Knight Essay Contest, and his students regularly participate in flag retirements and other SAR-sponsored events. He thanked the chapter for what they have done for his classroom.
- The annual celebration at the House in the Horseshoe will be the First Saturday in August.

After the discussion of new business, Daisy Dolicker, president of the NC CAR, gave a presentation about the CAR and her project for the year. President Gammon then led the members in the SAR Recessional, Compatriot Rev. Duncan Jones gave the benediction, and the meeting was adjourned at 7:45.
