We had experienced a moment of trepidation early in the week, when we learned that our keynote speaker Jack Manning was ill and could not attend. Fortunately, our compatriot Ken Wilson stepped up, re-worked some presentations he had previously given, and gave a wonderful presentation entitled "Highlights of Halifax County History." Aided by his wife Jan, he held the audience in the palm of his hand, and even had everyone laughing heartily with his amusing anecdotes. Ken did all this with almost no notice, but it came off without a hitch. Thank you, Ken!

At the luncheon, we had more than fifty present, and the food was wonderful as always. Several of our guests made a point of thanking the cooks personally, and our chapter got lots of good press from it. We are always proud of the Methodist Ladies who prepare such great meals for us, and we are grateful to them for their efforts.

Many people stayed on for the Charters of Freedom ceremony that same afternoon, held on the lawn of the former courthouse. Here we saw the unveiling of the beautiful markers commemorating the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the Halifax Resolves. When I saw the marching band from Roanoke Rapids High School coming up the street, its drums giving a steady beat, I felt proud indeed. When they played our national anthem, I almost had a lump in my throat. And when I saw the Color Guard passing by with all the flags, and we pledged allegiance to our

flag, I admit I found myself standing a little bit taller than usual. What a great feeling!

So many of our members were on hand, and so many helped. Geoff Pittard brought the tent, chairs, flags and flag stands, marched with the Color Guard, and presented the chapter wreath. ## Highlights from the Minutes of Mar., 2019, Meeting

The Halifax Resolves Chapter of the NCSSAR met on Wednesday, March 13, 2019, at the Halifax United Methodist Church in Halifax, NC. President David Gammon called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm. In the absence of our chaplain Rev. Duncan Jones, Compatriot Carlton Garner gave an invocation. Compatriot Ernest Bobbitt led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance and President Gammon led the SAR Pledge. The following guests were introduced: Knight Essay Winner Amber Silver and her mother, History Teacher of the Year Renny Taylor and his wife, JROTC Essay Winner Albert Tyndall and his mother, and his JROTC Commander.

After the meal, Essay winners Amber Silver and Albert Tyndall read their essays to the members. Afterwards, the students, their parents, and their teachers left the meeting.

In the absence of Secretary/Treasurer Steve Avent, President Gammon briefly discussed the minutes from the previous meeting, which were approved. The Treasurer's report indicated a total balance of \$2,886.36, of which the subcategories include the Youth Fund with a balance of \$1190.00 and the General Fund with a balance of \$1,696.36 The Treasurer's report was approved.

Under old business, the following topics were discussed:

- President Gammon reminded the members of the upcoming State Convention (April 5 and 6) and Halifax Day (April 12) and urged all to attend.
