Compatriots,

It's at this point that I usually tell you some story from my rather colorful family to make a point. Bear with me.

This is a story I have heard countless times from my mother. It happened in 1939, soon after my parents began dating. My future parents had a date to attend a formal dance. My father drove his old Ford across Fishing Creek to Scotland Neck to pick up my mother, and off they went for the evening. She said she felt especially stylish and pretty because she had made her own gown, which had a halter top. Bare shoulders – quite a daring fashion statement in those days. Unfortunately, since the Depression was still recent, she had no fur or other jacket to wear over it, but it was a

warm night and she probably felt a little devil-may-care.

Suddenly she realized my father had taken a turn onto a side road, and was driving through the dark night on sandy roads in the country. She was lost, and the landscape was pitch black around them. She exclaimed "Good grief, what sort of people live this far from civilization?"

And then the car rounded a curve, and suddenly there was a large house with lots of lights. My father cheerfully announced, "Well, this is where I live, and I want you to meet my parents. We're going to stop here on our way to the dance."

She sank down into her seat and figured all was lost. There she was, with her bare shoulders and no jacket. She was sure her date's parents would think she was a loose woman or worse. She summoned up her courage and went in the house to meet her fate.

My father introduced her to his parents. She said her future mother-in-law looked her up and down and said "Becky, you have lovely shoulders!"

Highlights from the Minutes of May., 2019, Meeting

The Halifax Resolves Chapter of the NCSSAR met on Wednesday, May 8, 2019, at the Halifax United Methodist Church in Halifax, NC. President David Gammon called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm. Our Chaplain Rev. Duncan Jones gave the invocation. Compatriot Ernest Bobbitt led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance and Compatriot Carl Witt led the SAR Pledge. The following guests were introduced: Traci Thompson, our guest speaker, and Bob Bittner, prospective member.

After the meal, Traci Thompson, Certified Genealogist and Librarian at the Braswell Library in Rocky Mount, gave a presentation entitled "John Evans: A Case of Mistaken Identity." Afterwards, President Gammon presented her with a certificate of appreciation.

In the absence of Secretary/Treasurer Steve Avent, President Gammon briefly discussed the minutes from the previous meeting, which were approved. The Treasurer's report indicated a total balance of \$2,886.36, of which the subcategories include the Youth Fund with a balance of \$1190.00 and the General Fund with a balance of \$1,696.36 The Treasurer's report was approved.

Under old business, the following topics were discussed:

- President Gammon summarized the success of Halifax Day 2019, and thanked all those who helped with it. He especially thanked Compatriot Ken Wilson, who did many tasks, including stepping in at the last minute to deliver the keynote address.
- President Gammon reminded everyone that Halifax Day 2020 will be April 18, 2020.
- Compatriot Ken Wilson, prospective member Joe Pearce, and Compatriot Michael Cooper all gave updates to the search for Patriot Harrison Macon's grave.
- President Gammon mentioned that a slate of officers is being developed, but there is still a need for a Vice President. He urged everyone to consider serving as an officer, and reminded them that a chapter without officers cannot continue.

Under new business, the following topics were discussed:

- As a continuation of the discussion from old business about the need for officers, Compatriot Geoff Pittard, who is on the slate to be our next President, reminded everyone that he works full time and has three children, and asked for assistance next year. There were no volunteers.
- Compatriot Ken Wilson reminded members that the preparation for Halifax Day 2020 should have already begun, and would need
 the assistance of everyone. He also reminded the members that he would not be heading up the Halifax Day preparations as in the
 past.
- Compatriot Wilson also reminded the members that if we do not have participation and officers, the chapter might have to close.
 President Gammon reminded the members that the state society does not want to see the chapter close, but without assistance, we would have no choice.
- President Gammon asked members to think about how they might help the chapter, and to contact him either by phone or email.

President Gammon then led the members in the SAR Recessional, Rev. Duncan Jones gave the benediction, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:00.
